Program Mission and Dedication:

The philosophy behind this program is that learning basic work skills and values is a major form of delinquency prevention and rehabilitation. Sooner or later, all youths must learn basic work ethics to survive in the work-a-day world. (Most teens already sense this fact).

Providing work for youth economically empowers them; makes them feel valued within the community; and very often awakens their interests or talents for future vocational or career training. This jobs program is designed to serve functional, well adjusted youth as well as youth at risk. However the 'at risk' youth and 'revolving-door' family court teens, seem the most 'hungry' for the benefits provided by our 'hands-on' program. Their short term outcomes are noticeable and heartwarming.

Additionally, Hawaiian values with counterparts in Western culture are emphasized wherever possible. These values include:

- \*Kupono Honesty, fairness, decent, righteousness.
- \*Aloha Non-judgemental attitudes and love toward one another.
- \*Aka'aka Laugh and have good fun.
- \*Lokahi Working together, unity.
- \*Ho'ihii Respect (for community, the sea, one another, self).
- \*Akua God (sense of Spirituality).
- \*Ha'aha'a Humility in everyday workings with others, modesty.
- \*Kuleana Responsibility for one's actions.
- \*Kokua Helping others in need with no strings attached.
- \*Na'auao Knowledge, learning, wisdom.
- \*Ha'aheo Pride in doing a good job.
- \*Malama Caring for taking care of facilities, equipment, each other, self.

This program has operated on a limited, but successful basis. . . working with youth in the Pa'ia, Wailuku and Kahului areas for nearly three years. In 1997 our mission is to expand services to West Maui, Kihei and Makawao.
